- C Choose to use EPA-registered insect repellent
- K Keep to the center of trails; avoid brush and tall grass
- **S** Shower within 2 hours after being outside to find/wash away ticks

returned, so if you have an LBS library book at home please send it in with your child. I will be sending home notices with your child if they have an outstanding book. If you have any questions about missing books, please



<u>Spanish</u>

Marvelous mayo! Kindergarten students are continuing to work on daily routines in Spanish and practicing reading and coloring greeting phrases. First grade is learning about "bichos" which are critters we see in the springtime, and talking about how to identify them through color and characteristics. Grades 2-6 are studying Colombia and learning facts about this beautiful country and its traditions. We are also using listening comprehension skills to watch and create dialogues about the weather. Additionally, we have talked about Cinco de Mayo. We now know that more people who live in America celebrate this holiday than Spanish-speaking people! ¡Qué interesante!



Preschool

AM: This month, we have been learning about water, how we use it, why we need it, and how to conserve it. We looked at the water cycle, we painted the sidewalk with water, and checked to see what happened after the sun was on it. We started our alphabet countdown and have been having fun with the theme days, and did a volcano experiment. We finished up our uppercase

alphabet books and got to take them home. We enjoyed our field trip to Echo Hill Park and the stream walk we did. In June, we will learn about summer

PM: This month, we have finished our community helpers unit, learned about camping, and water. We took a walking trip to the firehouse to meet with the fire company and the first aid

squad. We had a visit from the state police, and Mr. and Mrs. Maglione visited as well. We started our alphabet countdown and have been having fun with the theme days, We did a bubble experiment. We started learning the lowercase letters. We enjoyed our field trip to Echo Hill Park and the stream walk we did. Kindergarten

We are currently reviewing different types of stories. We worked on reading comprehension skills: describe connections, find the main idea and details, and discussed theme. We learned about the "magic e" so we can read both long and short vowel words. We continue to read our decodable stories. We will continue to write and practic our sight words. Many students have completed the sight word challenge. In math this month we completed our modules on two and three dimensional shapes. We are currently working on place value foundations representing numbers to 20. Our last two modules for the year are measurement and weight. The students will review areas that they need more practice in individually or complete challenge work when we are finished. This month in science we completed our Mystery

Science: Sunny Sky's Unit. We did activities to determine how the sun heats up the Earth's surface. In the final unit will be learning about pushes and pulls. We will conduct experiments to change the direction of a force.

We have been enjoying all the fun activities our alphabet countdown has been bringing these last few weeks of school. We began working on our "Memory Book", which is a collection of our favorite memories from Kindergarten. The students will be drawing and writing and including photographs, from the school year in their books. The class seemed to enjoy the trip to Fairview Farm. We really appreciate the PTA funding it for us. We are looking forward to our next trip to Echo Hill Park!



First Grade

I can't believe we're already wrapping up another year of school! It's been a pleasure getting to know your children for the second half of the school year! First grade worked hard this month to complete some final units and projects. The students enjoyed working on their Mother's Day gifts. They all wrote a heartfelt letter to their mom on shrinky dink paper, and we made keychains out of the final product. We're grateful for all of our wonderful, loving moms!

In science, we have finally completed the animal research books. Soon we will buddy read them with 2nd grade. Now, we will begin a Social Studies unit on Maps and Globes.

In math, the students learned how to interpret and answer questions about bar graphs, picture graphs, and tally charts. Now, we are learning how to add and subtract two-digit numbers with base ten blocks. Later, we will end the year with a quick unit on telling time to the hour and half hour.

In reading, we will be reading a couple of persuasive texts. We'll learn that the author provides their opinion on a topic and gives reasons to support their opinion to persuade their audience. We've also been practicing our high-frequency words with fun games.

Check out our trip to Fairview Farm, where students explored the rock cycle up close with hands-on learning!

Second Grade

May has been a wonderful month for our Second Grade students! In social studies, we diligently prepared to share our Colonial Days learning with our families. Traveling back to 1784, we explored a simpler time and presented

twelve unique colonial jobs. Students showcased either handmade or authentic artifacts, making the experience even more engaging. Together, we made butter and cream, learned a colonial dance, and sang a song. Our authentic attire added to the enjoyment, creating lasting memories and valuable lessons. In math, we have been reviewing and gearing up for third grade! Our students have mastered three-digit

addition and subtraction, and we've now begun tackling subtraction across zeros. In reading, we enjoyed the novel <u>Pioneer Cat</u> by William Hooks. This story introduced us to the joys, challenges, and pioneering spirit that motivated many to venture west in search of new land. Throughout our social studies journey this semester, we've also reflected on the complex and often painful history of colonialism and westward expansion, particularly for Native Americans and people of color. In science, we are learning how scientists classify plants based on their reproductive methods. Additionally, we had a great time sewing and weaving as we created heart





keychains for Mother's Day. We've also

welcomed back a few Flat Stanleys! From Virginia to Scotland, and even Switzerland to Arizona - Flat Stanley has had amazing journeys to share. We are very thankful to our friends and families who made this reading project fun-filled with real-life learning. We have also thoroughly enjoyed our End-of-the-Year ABC countdown. My personal favorite was celebrating the life and art of Eric Carle on "E" day! The remaining days of the month will be filled with review and a heartfelt trip down memory lane, celebrating an amazing year together.

Third Grade

Third grade has been busy with two class trips. The one class trip was to Morris Museum. The guest artist at the museum focused on nature. To tie it all together, I had my friend, a wildlife artist, Dale Muller, video meet the fourth and third graders. The students had great questions and seemed to really enjoy her art.

We have been busy completing our academic school year. We have partnered with fifth graders in some science experiments. They have grown so much since I left in December. It has been pure joy teaching them again.

Fourth Grade

What a whirlwind of a month we have experienced in Fourth Grade! We accomplished so many goals this year and are super proud of our growth. The month of May kicked off with a fabulous trip to the Morris Museum. We were lucky enough to be introduced to the delightful artwork of James Prosek. His studies of nature and how we order and name things were really interesting, and kept our students curious and engaged throughout

our visit. The Morris Museum offers great hands-on experiences, as well as gallery explorations. And how fortunate we were to have artist Dale Marie Muller

And now fortunate we were to have aftist Date Marie Multer educate us during a 3rd/4th-grade Google Meet! The students were attentive and focused on Ms. Muller's sharing of her life experience and artwork. Their inquisitive nature compelled them to learn more about the artist and her work through their dynamic question-and-answer session. We thanked Ms. Muller with handwritten notes of thanks, as well as samples of our own artwork.



Our class adjusted to the testing week schedule and rainy days

like champions! We had some fun collaborative Lego build activities, meet-ups with other grades, and we started our portfolio of Poetry throughout the first few weeks of May. We were super lucky to welcome some Mystery Readers throughout the last few weeks of this month!

We were able to finish our read-aloud selections, *I Survived: The Revolutionary War* by Lauren Tarshis and *Class Dismissed* by Allan Wooddrow, *and* begin our new novel study, *Hatchet*, by Gary Paulsen. We will end our time together with Judy Blume's *Tales of a Fourth Grade Nothing* read aloud. The students have become experts at identifying so many elements of figurative language, imagery, themes, and main ideas in literature and poetry.





Math, science, and social studies kept us super curious, problem-solving, and making connections to our world with fractions, energy experiments, debates, craftivities, and so much more!

We look forward to celebrating our poetry, creativity, and awesome year of learning at the Poetry Cafe on June 10th at 11 AM. We hope to see you there so we can share our last whole-class event together!

Fifth Grade

From play practice to band rehearsals, and from epic novels to seven days of state testing, it's been a nonstop month of activity for our fifth-grade class. A number of popular and engaging chemistry experiments have highlighted our afternoons. We have explored what exactly is happening during chemical reactions and used them to do everything from polishing old brown pennies, finding what substances react with acids, and – as if by magic – changing a steel nail into a copper nail, at least on the surface! In these explorations, we were thrilled to be joined by the third grade class, as we learned what

it was like to be an alchemist from long ago, trying to secure riches by using science. We didn't make gold, but we did learn a lot and have a great time!

In reading, we've completed *Holes*, a novel about how a series of curses that stretch back generations can continue to shape our world. The story also shows how a single act of courage and virtue can begin to set things right. By watching the film, we've seen how the major themes contained in the book are presented visually by the actors, screenwriters, and film editors. *Holes* shows us that even though we can never know what the future holds, everything we do impacts the future, for the worse or for the better.

One thing the future will definitely see is a tree that our class helped plant to mark Arbor Day. Lebanon's head of the Shade Tree Committee taught us about the importance of trees in neighborhoods and helped us plant our own dogwood tree along the side of the LBS parking lot. As it grows, it will be a great friend to the black gum tree, planted last year!

And in social studies, fifth graders are going back in to the past to research a significant time, person, or event to create a panoply of American History! Students are taking on topics from World War II, the Underground Railroad, the mid-20th century, and even the Bull Moose himself, Teddy Roosevelt! They will look into these events and see how they fit into the stream of history, affecting us all still today. It has been a pleasure reporting on the learning and work that the 5th grade has been up to throughout the 2024-2025 school year. The entire class wishes everyone a terrific summer and looks forward to seeing everyone back at LBS in the Fall!



Sixth Grade

It hardly seems possible but we are counting down the days to the end of 6th grade already! We are busy preparing for this year's musical, *High School Musical*, while looking forward to the end-of-year field trips and activities!
